### Speaker Biographies

**Krista Hinson** is the Director, State and Federal Government Relations for the South Carolina Hospital Association. In this role, she researches state and federal law, legislation, and regulation and represents the state's nearly 100 hospitals to elected officials during the legislative process. Prior to joining SCHA in 2013, she worked on political campaigns throughout the Midwest.

Krista received her Master of Health Administration in 2015 from the University of South Carolina. During her time there, she served as President of the Healthcare Executive Student Association and was the recipient of the Foster G. McGaw Scholarship for leadership and academic excellence.

When she is not at the State House, Krista is active in the Young Leaders Society of the United Way of the Midlands and the Contemporaries of the Columbia Museum of Art. She and her husband live in West Columbia with their two daughters.

**Jennifer Hollingsworth** is a litigation attorney in Columbia, South Carolina. She is a member of the health care practice group at Nexsen Pruet, LLC. Jennifer has her master's degree in social work and focuses her practice primarily in the areas of health care dispute and reimbursement litigation, as well as government investigations and compliance.
